



# NO FIRES

## Due to Wildfire Danger

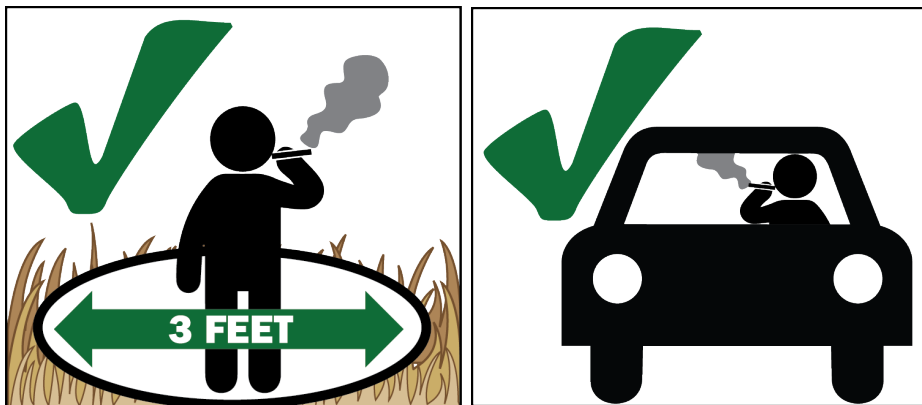
### PERMITTED



Portable cooking stoves or lanterns using liquefied or bottled fuel may still be used in all areas. Propane fire pits when used away from vegetation and other burnable material.



Motorized travel on roads and trails outlined in the Motor Vehicle Use Map.

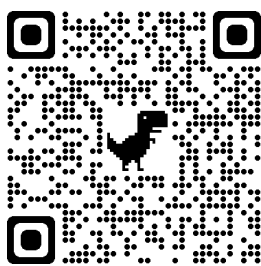


You can smoke in an enclosed vehicle or building, in a designated campground, in boats on lakes and rivers, or while stopped in an area at least 3 feet in diameter that is clear of all flammable material.



### Generators

With a spark arresting device properly installed and operated away from vegetation or other burnable material.



### PROHIBITED



Building, maintaining, attending or using a fire, campfire or stove fire, including a charcoal fire and pellet fire. There are no exceptions for developed or hosted campgrounds.



Discharging a Firearm. Hunting is permissible. Persons possessing a valid hunting license who are legally attempting to take game are exempt from this section of the prohibition.



Smoking, except within an enclosed vehicle or building, a designated campground, or while stopped in an area at least three feet in diameter that is barren or cleared of all flammable material.



Possessing, discharging or using any kind of firework or other pyrotechnic device. Using an explosive.



Possessing or using a motor vehicle off National Forest System Roads and Trails, except when operating in compliance with travel management rule and the Motor Vehicle Use Map.
